Shepard's[®] Citations Service, the only online citations service to offer the full spectrum of editorial analysis, is now the only citations service to pinpoint references that “question” the validity of the citation you entered.

And you see it right at the top of your *Shepard's* report so you get more up-front analysis to guide you before you research further.

The editorial phrase “Questioned By” has long existed in *Shepard's* Citations Service, part of the red “Warning” signal indicator. But now it stands on its own to draw attention to its unique importance so that you can assess its impact for your particular research. Here’s the definition as it appears in the *Shepard's* Signal[™] legend:



Questioned By:

The orange “Q” *Shepard's* Signal indicates that citing opinions question the continuing validity or precedential value of the case you are *Shepardizing*[™] because of intervening circumstances, including judicial or legislative overruling.



Though not “Overruled” or “Superseded,” Questioned By analysis alerts you that the citing court—as opposed to a law review editor, commentator, etc.—believes that a case or new legislative or regulatory development has transpired, impacting some or all of the case you *Shepardized*[™] negatively. The Orange “Q” makes that distinction clear for you.

Navigate directly to the questioning citing references. Click on the Questioned link in your *Shepard's* Summary report to move to the first reference with that analysis. Or click on the drop-down arrow next to Cites at the bottom of your report screen, then highlight Questioned under Negative Analysis. Or, use the FOCUS[™]-Restrict By feature to restrict the *Shepard's* report to just those citing references assigned the “questioned by” phrase.
